Evaluation of the effectiveness of the State Plan – Mr. Taylor		Mr. Taylor reported that the Executive Committee met on March 25, 2015 and accepted the Advisory Committee's Evaluation of the Effectiveness of the State Plan. The State Plan and Work Plan were updated with revised dates and the most current data, recommendations from RTI International (the independent evaluator) and the Advisory Committee (updated dates and federal tax efforts incorporated into the other tax efforts in Goal 1), and new rationale from the 2014 CDC Best Practices. The updated plans are posted on the website.

FY2016 and FY 2017 Advisory and Executive Committee compensation – Ms. Prom	Ms. Prom reviewed the following: One of the statutory duties of the Advisory Committee is to set the compensation for the Advisory Committee and the Executive Committee, but compensation cannot exceed the daily compensation rate of the legislature. The Advisory Committee policy is to set compensation at the daily rate of the legislature. This information is provided to all board members at their Advisory Committee orientation.	Ms. Prom reported that in the final approved version of 2015 House Bill 1001, the legislature set their daily compensation rate at \$172 for FY2016 and at \$177 for FY2017, a 3% annual increase.

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committee discussed how Hawaii raised the minimum age of purchase from 18 to 21.

The committee discussed the Master Settlement Agreement and the Tobacco Prevention and Control Trust Fund. At the June 16, 2015 Budget Section meeting, legislators asked questions about the \$81 million deposited into the fund thus far. Mr. Keiser noted that the state budget outlook changed significantly from December 2014 to January 2015, due to the reduction in the price of oil. If the oil price does not recover over the next year, the 2017 legislature will be very interested in this agency's trust fund to meet its needs. It is imperative the committee and agency staff are able to demonstrate program successes, because Mr. Keiser said the legislators are more familiar with the negative comments about the agency (i.e., an initiated measure, directed funding to tobacco control). House members believe there will be an initiated measure to raise the tobacco tax.

Dr. Johnson reminded the committee the MSA legal argument was not about people who got sick from tobacco use, but was about the tobacco industry targeting underage youth and otherwise suppressing information on the health impact of tobacco. Ms. Clara Sue Price and Mr. Keiser recalled that the legislative mindset after the MSA funds were available post-1998 was that funds were "payback" for tobacco-related costs such as Medicaid expenditures, and that the state budget did not
